Cosmology

Definition: Cosmology is the study of the origin and structure of the universe and of the gods, goddesses, and other spiritual forces that are believed to inhabit it.

1. In Maya culture, the cosmology was based on the idea that the gods created the world and that it had four distinct levels: the underworld, the middleworld, the skyworld, and the earth. This belief shaped their understanding of the world and their place within it.
2. The Maya cosmology also shaped their religious practices, as offerings were made to the gods in various forms and rituals were performed to honor them. For example, the Maya would carry out elaborate ceremonies in which offerings were placed in the sacred cenote in order to appease the gods and ensure a bountiful harvest.

Supernaturalism

Definition: Supernaturalism is the belief in the existence of forces or entities that are beyond the natural world and not subject to its laws.

1. In Maya culture, supernaturalism was an important part of their religious beliefs. The gods were believed to have the power to influence events in the natural world and were seen as having an active role in the lives of the Maya people.
2. The Maya believed that their gods were responsible for the success or failure of their crops, and that their prayers and offerings could influence the gods to bring them prosperity. This is seen in the Maya's practice of offering human sacrifices to ensure the success of their crops.

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Shamans

Definition: Shamans are spiritual leaders who use rituals and practices to interact with the spirit world and to heal people's physical and mental ailments.

1. In Maya culture, shamans were seen as intermediaries between the gods and the people. They used rituals and offerings to help the people seek guidance and healing from the gods.
2. Shamans were also responsible for performing ceremonies such as rain dances to invoke the gods and bring rain to their crops. An example of this is the ritual of the Sacred Fire where shamans would light a fire and offer it to the gods in hopes that they would bring rain.

Rituals

Definition: Rituals are set ceremonies or practices that are used to achieve a particular end, such as honoring the gods, seeking guidance, or healing the sick.

1. In Maya culture, rituals were a key part of their religious practices. Rituals were used to honor and appease the gods, to seek guidance from them, and to heal the sick.

Iconography

Definition: Iconography is the visual representation of religious or spiritual concepts or figures in art or other forms of media.

1. In Maya culture, iconography was an important part of their religious practices. Symbols and images of gods and goddesses were used in art and architecture to represent their power and importance.
2. Iconography was also used in rituals and ceremonies, such as the Mayan ballgame where the players would wear costumes depicting gods and goddesses to invoke their favor and bring them luck.

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Calendar

Definition: Calendar is a system of organizing and tracking time, often based on the cycles of the sun and moon.

1. In Maya culture, the calendar was an important tool for keeping track of time and predicting the future. The calendar was based on the cycles of the sun and moon, and the Maya believed that these cycles had an influence on the events of the world.

Animism

Divinity

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Sacrifice

Religious Hierarchy

2. Below the priests and shamans were the warrior and noble classes, who served as the protectors and advisers of the people. They were responsible for protecting the people from outside threats and for offering counsel to the leaders.
